Thank you for your recent letter. I am glad to have your views and appreciate your thoughtfulness in sharing them with me.

The President's pardon of Mr. Nixon was at the least untimely, and as I said at the time, I completely disagree with his action. While the pardon protects Mr. Nixon against federal prosecution for acts committed before his resignation, it does not preclude calling him as a witness in the trials of his aides scheduled this month. The testimony of Richard Nixon is, I believe, vital to bringing out the full story of Watergate. As I am sure you are aware, Mr. Nixon has been served with a subpoena, and Judge Sirica has taken under advisement his request to be excused. Meanwhile, the Senate has acted to preserve the tapes and files in Washington so that they too will be available to the Special Prosecutor.
