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NEWARK, Feb. 27—A Negro student occupation of a classroom building on the Rutgers University campus here ended shortly before daybreak this morning, three days to the hour after it had begun.

About 30 students emerged from Conklin Hall into the darkness at 5:45 A.M., satisfied with an agreement that had been arranged with university officials over demands for a larger Negro enrollment on the campus and a greater voice in university admissions policy.

The occupiers of the liberal-arts classroom building, which also contains faculty offices and the university switchboard, were members of the Black Organization of Students.

Other members of the organization, which numbers about 100 of the 130 Negro students here, negotiated the settlement in day and night sessions with Dr. Mason W. Gross, the uni-

versity president; Malcolm D. Talbott, Rutgers vice president for the Newark campus and other university officials.

No disciplinary action against the sit-ins was in prospect.

Later in the day, with a spirit of settlement in the air, an all-night sit-in by Negro students and their supporters ended at the College Center at the Camden branch of the university, where the liberal arts college is known as the College of South Jersey.
